



# Dr. Walt Larimore, Award-Winning Medical Journalist, Best-Selling Author, and Family Physician Educator to Speak at Annual Meeting



Dr. Larimore has been a medical journalist since 1995, hosted the TV Show "Ask the Family Doctor" from 1995-2000 and from 2001 to 2004, hosted "Focus on Your Family's Health." He currently provides weekly medical commentary for WDBO in Orlando, WMBI in Chicago, WISG in Indianapolis and WBCL in Ft. Wayne.

Dr. Larimore has appeared in interviews on NBC's "The Today Show;" "CBS Good Morning;" "CNN Headline News;" CNN's "Anderson Cooper 360;" CNBC's "The Abrams Report;" PBS' "Family Works;" and several Fox News shows. He has also been interviewed on Bill O'Reilly's and Sean Hannity's shows.

Dr. Larimore has written or co-written over a dozen books. Some of his titles include The Highly Healthy Child, 10 Essentials of Highly Healthy People, Going Public with Your Faith: Becoming a Spiritual Influence at Work, Alternative Medicine: Christian Handbook, Why ADHD Doesn't Mean Disaster, Lintball Leo's Not-So-Stupid Questions (Boys Ask about their Body), SuperSized Kids: How to Rescue your Child from the Obesity Threat and his most recent release, Alternative Medicine: The Options, the Claims, the Evidence-How to Choose Wisely.

At the CPFI Annual conference, Dr. Larimore will speak on "Evangelism as a Process: Being Salt and Light in Healthcare" and "The Most Popular Medicines: What are the Claims?"

## **CPFI National Student Council Update**

CPFI initiated a National Student Council in August 2007. The intent of the council is to develop a community feel among the CPFI student affiliated groups (often referred to as student chapters), facilitate growth through idea sharing, encourage established student affiliated groups through guidance, and assist those initiating a student affiliated group. The council currently consists of student representatives from 40 universities. In November, the council coordinated a nationwide student outreach with Operation Christmas Child, which resulted in approximately 682 gift boxes being prepared and sent by CPFI student affiliated groups. This outreach was chosen because it "brings joy and hope to children in desperate situations around the world through gift-filled shoe boxes and the Good News of God's love." Information on this outreach with synopses from multiple council representatives will be published in the next edition of Christianity and Pharmacy. During the spring semester, the council will focus its efforts on providing guidance to current and future student affiliated groups. The first example of this can be seen in the document titled "10 Suggestions to Serve as an Outstanding Advisor," which was created based on council representatives' feedback on the beneficial actions of their advisors. ## Reaching Out -Medical Missions

At Wingate University School of Pharmacy (WUSOP), our students have the option of doing a fourth year elective



rotation on the mission field in Honduras. We are very excited to have this rotation available to our students. How wonderful it is to be able to share Jesus Christ and pharmacy all at the same time! Each time students leave on this rotation, they take a bag of medications with them. The WUSOP chapter of CPFI has started a medication drive to help these students take even more much needed items to the area.

Many OTC medications are needed such as ibuprofen, acetaminophen, vitamins (both for children and adults, but children's vitamins are needed the most), anti-parasitics, cough and cold (especially liquids for kids), lice treatment, scabies lotion, toothbrushes, toothpaste, and first aid items (e.g., antibiotic ointment, dressings, tape, band-aids). Monetary donations are also accepted to purchase prescription products. We hope to keep this an ongoing outreach project as long as we continue to have students elect this rotation.

God is working in great ways with our students who travel on this rotation. This is a great way for WUSOP to be able to share Jesus Christ with those who may not know Him here at school, in Honduras, or between here and there.
