How To Measure Success with CPFI Student Affiliated Groups? The Students Appeal for Professional Member Support

I can tell you in one year CPFI has grown from having student affiliated groups at 31 universities to 48 plus gaining firm contacts at an additional 11 universities. And I can tell you for the first time CPFI students joined nationwide to contribute shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child in November of 2007, which resulted in more than 670 boxes being sent to children in need. But, is this how we measure success? I would say true success is much more difficult to describe and quantify because it is the transforming of individual lives. Success is seen in a pharmacy student in Georgia who formerly opposed organized religion, but in a time of crisis they reach out to their college's CPFI student group. It is evident in the "lukewarm" Christian student who attended their local CPFI student group Bible studies, which resulted in a decision to serve as a full-time missionary pharmacist. It is apparent in the CPFI student in Arizona who stops and prays with classmates prior to each major exam. I could go on about student mission trips to Uganda and countless other individual stories; however I think the point is made.

In my opinion, there is no question God is accomplishing much through CPFI student affiliated groups at universities nationwide. Nonetheless, there is still room for growth and support is needed. An example of this is a P1 student in California who recently contacted CPFI stating "she was reaching out in a void" for Christian support. The CPFI Board of Directors and a group of recent graduates are making efforts to meet the needs of student groups. Moreover, students desperately desire for professional members who are willing to volunteer as a guest speaker and/or mentor. They want local professional members to share their struggles, teach them how to keep a balanced life, and tell them how to incorporate faith in their profession. At the CPFI Annual Meeting, we were blessed to have nine professional members volunteer, but many more are needed.
