Profile of the Cedarville University School of Pharmacy

Cedarville University is a Christ-centered learning community equipping students for lifelong leadership and service through an education marked by excellence and grounded in biblical truth. More than just a mission statement, this focus attracts more than 3,000 Christian students from around the nation to study in 100 academic programs on a beautiful 400-acre campus in southwest Ohio. Outstanding students, world-class facilities, talented professors, and award-winning technology contribute to an education *U.S.News & World Report*, *The Princeton Review*, and *Peterson's Competitive Colleges* all recognize as one of the best in the Midwest.

Responding to the national need for pharmacists, believing that pharmacy complements the University's other academic strengths, and sensing God's leading to embrace the opportunity to engage healthcare through a Christ-centered pharmacy program, Cedarville University announced the establishment of the School of Pharmacy in 2007. This announcement culminated more than two years of feasibility study, including the assembling of more than two dozen pharmacy-related professionals from around the nation to serve on the Pharmacy Advisory Council. After examining the proposal, this group wholeheartedly recommended the establishment of the program and meets twice each year to provide guidance to the School. Cedarville welcomed its first class of approximately 50 prepharmacy students in the fall of 2009 and anticipates graduating its first Pharm.D. students in 2016, pending appropriate approvals from the Ohio Board of Regents, the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools, and the Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education. Plans call for increasing the class size to 70 over time. Ultimately, the School of Pharmacy will involve a faculty and staff of approximately 40 professionals.

The seven-year curriculum, involving three years of prepharmacy courses and four years of graduate/professional studies, builds upon the University's rich heritage in the sciences and notable liberal arts core, which includes a minor in Bible for every student. Each semester of the program features a course that provides orientation to some aspect of the pharmacy profession. Additionally, students are encouraged to take full advantage of the many co-curricular opportunities offered, including more than 150 volunteer ministries that touch lives locally, regionally, and around the world. More than 60 student organizations invite involvement, including a student chapter of CPFI.

Four themes characterize the direction of Cedarville's School of Pharmacy. The first is Christ-centered service. Believing that every Christian is called to serve others as a reflection of Christ's example and commission, the School encourages each student to view his or her role as an opportunity to touch lives, not just earn a paycheck. The second, growing out of the first, is patient safety. The financial and health impact of medication adverse drug events and misuse is well documented. By training the next generation of pharmacists, the School promotes advances in this important arena, helping both the profession as well as those served by the profession. The third, also related to service, is personalized medicine. Pharmacogenomics, which enables health professionals to develop more precise treatment programs, will allow the School to prepare graduates equipped for maximum patient impact while helping to address the rising cost of health care. The fourth, informatics, reflects Cedarville's extensive computer resources and reputation as a leader in technology integration. Pharmacy graduates will utilize some of the latest instructional and pharmacy technology tools in their education and be challenged to be technological innovators as they enter the pharmacy profession.

God has brought together a faculty leadership team for the School of Pharmacy characterized by a passion for Christ, a calling to serve students, and a vision to in-
