(NIV) Jesus also tells us to concentrate on the Father when we pray saying, "But when you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will	

reward you." Matthew 6:6 The story of the persistent widow begins by Luke telling us "Then Jesus told his disciples a parable to show them that they should always pray and not give up." Luke 18:1-13 A disciple asks Jesus to teach them to pray in Luke 11:1-4 and Jesus demonstrates by praying the Lord's Prayer. Jesus goes on to tell them more, "So I say to you: Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives; the one who seeks finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be opened."
