

The Widow's Offering

And he sat down opposite the treasury and watched the people putting money into the offering box ... but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on." Mark 12:41-44 (ESV)

Thanksgiving is often an occasion for us to reflect on how God has graciously blessed us this past year. As you do that this year I want to encourage you to remember the gospel story about the widow's offering and how Jesus looked upon that gift. "And he sat down opposite the treasury and watched the people putting money into the offering box. Many rich people put in large sums. And a poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which make a penny. And he called his disciples to him and said to them, 'Truly, I say to you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the For they all contributed out of their offering box. abundance, but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on. "" Mark 12:41-44 (ESV). Notice that what was important to Jesus was the sacrifice that she made to give. He was not concerned about the amount, but that she had given all that she had and that she was trusting that He was going to provide what she was going to need to continue.

The leadership of CPFI considers it a joy to take turns sharing a message of encouragement in our monthly newsletter. In November the past two



years much of my story has been about our son Josh and his journey of recovery from brain cancer. I wish I could share how God has miraculously restored Josh to perfect health. I can see that there has been miraculous healing, because two years ago I talked about how he was just waking up from his coma and how we saw some of the first movement in his limbs. It is amazing how far he has come from there, but he is nowhere near where he wants to be. Josh is still in a wheel chair, making slow progress in relearning to walk and maintain his balance. Tremors still limit his ability to feed himself and do some personal cares, but more and more he conquers some of those small battles. As Christians, we are indeed a blessed people. We are eternally thankful to our Lord. It is quite interesting when a New Testament passage (Ephesians 2:8-10 – "For by grace you are saved through faith, and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God; it is not from works, so that no one can boast. For we are his workmanship, having been created in Christ Jesus for good works that God prepared beforehand so we may do them.") is combined with an Old Testament passage (Exodus 31:1-5 - "The Lord spoke to Moses: "See. I have chosen Bezalel son of Uri, the son of Hur, of the tribe of Judah, and I have filled him with the Spirit of God in skill, in understanding, in knowledge, and in all kinds of craftsmanship, to make artistic designs for work with gold, with silver, and with bronze, and with cutting and setting stone, and with cutting wood, to work in all kinds of craftsmanship."). In a similar fashion as the Lord graciously chose and gifted Bezalel, He graciously saved and equipped us to serve in the ministry area of His choosing. Let's pray: "Lord, thank You for saving and equipping us to serve You. Please help us to understand where to serve You and we ask that You will create the path to do so. Please, as an organization, individuals, and families, fill us with Your Spirit in skill, understanding, knowledge, and craftsmanship to consistently and faithfully serve You for Your glory. In Jesus name, amen."
