The National Student Retreat, coordinated by Jordann Hoernemann and Haylee Sandry, students at North Dakota University Systems, began on Wednesday and concluded on Thursday afternoon. Speakers included Brandon Bookstaver, Joy Greene, Kathy Moore, Jessica Theisen, Alan Spies and Amber Wood. Various student activities continued throughout the 4-day event.

CPFI also held a mid-year meeting of the Board of Directors. President Jeffrey Copeland presided over the meeting. Immediate Past President Fred Eckel gave the opening devotion and prayer. His focus was on the sovereignty of God, with passages from Jeremiah 29, Lamentations 3 and Ezra 7. We were reminded that we need to know God to know God's plan for ourselves and for CPFI.
