Below are listed the 2017 goals of the mission committee with an update on our progress:

Short term missions projects:

• Actively participate on the Advisory Council of Global Health Outreach (GHO).

The GHO Advisory Council (GHO-AC) met January 13th and 14th in Bristol, TN. Due to scheduling conflicts, neither Ron nor Keith were able to attend. Attendance at next year's Advisory Council of GHO will be a priority if at all possible.


Have 2 pharmacists participate on every GHO team that goes out to the field.

In the year 2016 there were 100 pharmacists, students or techs that participated on 37 GHO trips. There were 6 trips that needed a pharmacist, but did not have one. So far this year we have 82 pharmacists (or students or techs) scheduled to participate on 30 teams. There are 4 other specialty teams that do not require a pharmacist. Six teams served without a pharmacist so far this year. There are 11 teams still to go without a pharmacist and could each use two. There are also 2 teams still to go this year that could use one more pharmacist. So if God is tugging at your heart, there are still opportunities to answer that call!

The 47 GHO trips in 2016 had 1051 participants. Thanks to all who have accepted the challenge to go on one of these GHO trips. More volunteers are definitely needed. Patients were served, prescriptions were filled, and praise God many indicated decisions to follow Christ. There were several trips where faculty went along with students, some who received clerkship credit for the experience. Altogether 42 students participated.

The tithe account provided \$5,250 in funding in 2016 for 2 pharmacists and 12 students to go on 7 different short-term trips. The requests were down considerably from previous years. From the beginning of 2017 until now, we have provided \$3,100 to 2 pharmacists and 5 students to participate on 4 short-term projects.

 Continue to improve awareness of these projects to our membership, by using the newsletter, journal and website to raise awareness and share the results of these short term mission projects.

The journal, newsletter and webpage are all being used to promote upcoming GHO opportunities.

Write a pharmacist's handbook that can be used for the teams that are going out

Ron Herman updated the Pharmacists Manual for Short-Term Missions. The manual, the Best Practices paper, prescription labels and a sample formulary are all available on the website. A new GHO Trip Participant Handbook was completed last year and is provided to all GHO participants.

Implement a mission's directed fundraiser

We have had a silent auction at the CPFI Annual Conference the past few years. A portion of this year's silent auction proceeds are to be used for mission activities by our brothers and sisters in Christ of CPFI Democratic Republic of Congo.

International Outreach:

• Obtain current information about long term mission opportunities for pharmacists and post on the website.

Nothing additional to report at this time.

• Develop a strategy for reaching out to and encouraging the development of Christian Pharmacy groups in other countries.

Bob Watt and Paul Kabanga Kapuya are charged to develop a proposal about how we can be a knowledge resource, not a financial resource, to see Christian Pharmacy groups begin to develop in other countries. Bob has been in Democratic Republic of Congo with Paul, this year, trying to strengthen and increase the number of contacts. Paul was planning to be here at this conference.

Evangelistic Outreach:

• Identify a subcommittee that will take on the charge of promoting evangelistic involvement of CPFI and other Christian pharmacists.

Jeff Copeland is attempting to put together a plan to keep the issue of personal outreach before our membership. There is an evangelism training program (Grace Prescriptions - https://cmda.org/resources/publication/grace-prescriptions) designed for medical professionals that is available in an eight-DVD (14-Modules) format and is given as a live seminar. If anyone is interested in helping Jeff Copeland as he takes on this important task, please let Jeff or myself know. Also, some people after reading our page that lists our beliefs, might want to know more about how they can have a relationship with God. As a result, there is a link to a page that helps seekers have their questions answered, and then tries to help them come to Christ (www.everystudentcom). We would like to consider more programing in this area.
