This year's 20th Annual CPFI meeting in Myrtle Beach, SC had approximately 93 pharmacists, students or nurses regis-



The council will consist of one member from each chapter. Chapters will determine independently how to appoint or elect their council member. During the CPFI Annual Student Retreat, development of the council will be further discussed during the Saturday, September 8th Open Forum at 10 am and the first council meeting will be held at 11 am on Sunday, September 9, 2007.

Introduction of the National Student Council provides an exciting opportunity to work collectively towards advancing student chapters. Personally, involvement in CPFI has been an enjoyable and fundamental part of my pharmacy education; therefore, I am looking forward to working with all 30 chapters to seek to grow in Christ as we develop into pharmacists. #### PLAN FOR INTRODUCING CPFI NATIONAL STUDENT COUNCIL: 2007-2008 SCHOOL YEAR

September at the Annual Student Retreat: Establish initial council members and hold first council meeting.

September – December: Continue to recruit council members from each chapter and begin e-mail communication among the council. Post council members' names, contact information, and photographs into a directory on the CPFI webpage. In addition, the council will coordinate an outreach event in which all chapters are invited to participate (e.g., packing shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child).

**November:** Hold an optional second council meeting at the Global Missions Health Conference.

January: The council will plan a student "meet and greet" and student session(s) during the CPFI Annual Meeting in Glen Eyrie, Colorado.

February - May: The council will begin to post fundamental documents on the CPFI website to provide guidance to chapters. The documents will be compiled from input by council members and reviewed by the CPFI Board. The documents may include:

- Example chapter bylaws
- Potential chapter officer positions and descriptions
- · Possible chapter committees and teams
- · Outreach, fellowship, and fundraising ideas
- · Potential weekly, monthly, and semester goals
- · Example welcome week presentation

June at the CPFI Annual Meeting: Host third council meeting and the council will lead a student "meet and greet" and student session(s).

September at the CPFI Annual Student Retreat: Reappoint and/or reelect council members and hold first council meeting for the 2008-2009 school year.

In the following years, the National Student Council will serve to:

- Facilitate communication among the chapters and the CPFI Board.
- Host student sessions at the CPFI Annual Meeting and possibly at the Global Missions Health Conference.
- Coordinate an annual national student outreach event.
- Maintain an annual council member directory.
- Update and create fundamental documents to be posted on the CPFI website.
- Provide personal guidance to those with a desire to establish a chapter and act as a resource for students.

As an officer for the past year, I have seen God move in this organization in amazing ways, growing the group from just a few members at biweekly meetings to far greater

membership and awesome opportunities to get involved, enjoy fellowship, and spread God's love through our campus and community! Below is a list reviewing some of the things that we have done over the past year or so:

#### Freshman Letters & WelcomeFest

In efforts to expand our group, we decided to personally send letters to freshmen who showed interest in CPFI through a chapel newsletter. Also, we made a presence as a group at our fall WelcomeFest, which orients students with campus organizations and opens opportunity for involvement.

#### Prescription Encouragement Vials

This has been a favorite outreach for our chapter. Going with a theme of "Dispensing Hope, Love, and Encouragement," our verse for the labels is "May our Lord Jesus Christ himself and God the Father, who loved us and by His grace gave us eternal encouragement and good hope, encourage your hearts and strengthen you in every good deed and word." (2 Thessalonians 2:16). We then fill the vials with verses and candy and usually distribute them as an outreach on campus around the time of finals.

#### T-shirts, Devotional Books, and Encouraged Membership

This year, we encouraged members to pay a \$10 fee, which provided a devotional book for fall quarter as well as t-shirts. We believe this was effective in improving commitment to the group. We are so excited about the growth that we have had in our group this year in comparison to prior years!

#### Themes

For each quarter of the year, we have had themes that our devotions and meetings have focused around. In the fall, our theme was "Dispensing Hope, Love and Encouragement." Each officer prepared a devotional for one of our four meetings of the quarter (we meet every other week in our ten-week quarters, and one of the weeks we had a picnic instead of a regular meeting). Devotionals were centered on how God uses us as pharmacists and as students as well in His hope, love, encouragement, and "dispensing" (service). We had devotional books prepared in advance, and having the officers themselves do devotionals helped the members get to know us better at the beginning of the year. During winter quarter, our theme was "Counting on Christ," and this quarter our theme is "Spring into Service."

#### Fall Retreat

This fall marked our first self-organized day retreat which we held in conjunction with another similar organization from the University of Toledo. We had social activities, a speaker, small group discussion and prayer, a nursing home outreach, and more. We are in the beginnings of organizing a similar retreat for next year and hope to open it up to even more individuals.

#### Polar Drop and Shop

This is one of our biggest activities and this is the second year that CPFI (along with our campus Fellowship of Christian Athletes group) has coordinated the event. We offer this as a service to the local community to allow parents an opportunity to shop for Christmas gifts or just relax for the day while we take care of their children and provide a fun-filled day of games, crafts, singing, and even a visit from Santa! More than 66 ONU students from both CPFI and FCA helped to make the Polar Drop and Shop a great success for the 72 children from the surrounding community who attended.

#### Operation Christmas Child

This was an awesome opportunity for students to individually give and also grow in service as a group and gain a vision for world missions.

#### Sing-A-Thon group

One of our campus organizations holds an annual Sing-A-Thon in December, so we got together a group of members who were willing to support the fundraiser event by singing during a half-hour time slot.

#### **Faculty Cookie Outreach**

To show our appreciation and Christ's love to the Pharmacy Faculty here at ONU, we arranged cookie baking and surprise deliveries of fresh-baked goodies along with encouragement verses.

#### Relay For Life team

This has been our first year getting a team together with CPFI members to support our university's Relay for Life. To help raise money as a team rather than leaving the responsibility up to individual efforts, we had Bowl-a-Thon and Bake Sale fundraisers. 10th Anniversary Reception

This year marked our chapter's 10th year, so in honor of this and to provide an opportunity to connect with former organization advisors and sponsors, we held a dessert reception with speakers who have been involved in our CPFI chapter through the years.
