**Right Away, All the Way, and With a Happy Heart
Looking to Abraham as a Model of Faithful Obedience**

Genesis 22 (ESV) contains a story that many of us remember well from our 3rd grade Sunday school classes. It highlights the faithful obedience of a one-hundred-year-old man named Abraham, who willingly offered the most precious thing he had -- his son -- as a sacrifice to God.

We have a dear couple in our church who tirelessly works to shape their children's obedience, using the model "obey right away, all the way, and with a happy heart." Abraham's example in this chapter seems to follow this model precisely and has been instructive to our family as well.

We see instructions in verses 1 and 2 that highlight exactly what God was asking of Abraham. Though lacking detail, His instructions were clear: "Take your son ... go... and offer him there as a burnt offering ... on one of the mountains of which I will tell you."

For many of us, these instructions would have likely caused us to argue with God or at least to seek wisdom from others. In our fallen, rebellious nature, would we not have built a case for why God's instructions should have been disobeyed? Could it be that God was making a mistake? After all, Isaac was Abraham's promised son, specifically mentioned by name in Genesis 17:19. But, Abraham's response to this command is powerfully helpful.

Right Away

Verse 3 indicates that Abraham made obedience his top priority, when he "rose early in the morning." The text states that he even cut the wood he would need before he packed for the 3-day journey. When they came to "the place" (v9), Abraham immediately "built an altar there." Throughout this entire passage, there is never a hint of Abraham's delayed compliance.

All the Way

Verse 3 goes on to say that he quickly gathered all that he would need to satisfy the instructions he had received. He "saddled his donkey," "took two young men with him" as assistants, took "his son Isaac," "cut wood for the burnt offering," and "went to the place."

Further, in verse 6 the text notes that Abraham took "the fire and the knife." When Abraham built the altar (v9) he "laid wood in order." He had and did everything he needed to comply completely. Any deviation from this list would have likely impeded his ability to obey well.

With a Happy Heart

It is interesting there is absolutely no mention of Abraham complaining or grumbling about his assignment. In verse 8, when questioned by Isaac about the lamb for the sacrifice, Abraham simply notes that "God will provide ... a lamb..." Earlier in verse 5, within just a few minutes of plunging a knife into his son, Abraham told the two young assistants that he and Isaac were going "over there to worship." Not many of us when faced with the most gut-wrenching, confusing, and selfless task of our lives, would label our assignment as "worship" like Abraham did. Abraham's heart was clearly focused on ensuring nothing -- not even his attitude -- could hinder his ability to please his God.

The text (v12) notes that Abraham feared God and would not allow anything – even his precious son – to be withheld from his worship of God. As we all remember, Abraham complied so thoroughly that God sent an angel to intervene, preventing him from going further than desired (v11). And... because of his faith and obedience, God lavished His promised blessings on Abraham (v17-18).

Abraham or something less?

I am powerfully and personally convicted by this passage. How many times does God ask us to be faithful with tasks, much less serious than Abraham's? Would God find me with a happy heart or whining and complaining as I parent a child, help a student pharmacist, coach a faculty member, serve at church, or even love my amazing wife? Perhaps I comply, but do so slowly, sometimes even creating distractions that delay my compliance. Would God consider me to be obeying right away? Other times, I create ways where there is just no way for me to complete all the things asked of me. Would God see me as complying all the way?

Will you partner with me in asking God to work in our own hearts so that we – like Abraham -- will quickly, completely, and joyfully do what is asked of us? May we – like Abraham -- be found as faithful servants of the King most-high, loving Him more than we love ourselves and the things of this world.
